Fort Riley

Known as the "Home of the Big Red One," Fort Riley is located at the confluence of the Smoky Hill and Republican rivers in north central Kansas. This historic post hosts the headquarters, 1st Infantry Division (the Big Red One), the 1st Brigade, 2nd Heavy Brigade Combat Team, 4th Infantry Brigade Combat Team, 1st Sustainment Brigade, Combat Aviation Brigade and a "Top of the Line" Battle Simulation Center that utilizes "state of the art" equipment used to conduct Brigade/Battalion Battle Simulation exercises. Throughout the year, Fort Riley also provides support to the Army National Guard (ARNG) and United States Army Reserve among others. Fort Riley provides continuous training including live fire training for artillery, tanks and other heavy weapons for Soldiers of the Big Red One and other units.



Forbes Field, Air National Guard

Forbes Field is home to the 190th Air Refueling Wing (ARW) of the Kansas Air National Guard (KANG). It occupies 215 acres on the south side of Topeka Airport, located approximately 5 miles south of downtown Topeka, Kansas. The mission of the 190th ARW is to "Provide a professional trained militia, ready to serve community, state and nation". The 190th ARW occupies 7 administrative facilities, 16 industrial facilities, and 2 services facilities totaling approximately 523,100 square feet with 323 full time personnel. Unit training drills conducted once a month result in a surge of up to 1152 personnel. The unit currently flies the KC-135E/D Stratotanker such as the one shown flying over the State Capitol, Topeka.



Smoky Hill Range Air National Guard (ANG)

Smoky Hill Air National Guard (ANG) Range near Salina, Kansas, is the largest of bombing ranges in the Air National Guard inventory. Within Smoky Hill's 34,000 acres lies a 12,000 acre target area which is comprised of dual conventional ranges and three large tactical ranges. These tactical ranges provide the most realistic air-to-ground training available for all types of military aircraft. Smoky Hill also has four drop zones for cargo aircraft. In light of recent military technological applications, ANG F-16s are being modified to deliver precision guided munitions providing pinpoint accuracy to destroy enemy targets. To successfully deliver this weapon, pilots must practice deliveries on a recurring basis to obtain the highest degree of combat proficiency. Smoky Hill is one of three ANG air-to-ground ranges in the United States where pilots can practice these deliveries.



McConnell AFB

McConnell Air Force Base has a long history as an Air Force facility having been home to an Air Force Materiel Center, the 350th Air Combat Crew Training Wing and the Strategic Air Command and Tactical Air Command wings. The 381st Strategic Missile Wing operated 18 Titan ICBM sites from 1960 to 1986. Currently, the 22nd Air Refueling Wing (ARW) is the host unit for McConnell AFB and is one of only three supertanker KC-135 Stratotanker wings in the Air Force. The 22nd ARW, under Air Mobility Command, supports worldwide aerial refueling and airlift operations, thus providing global reach for troops, equipment and supplies, and supports global contingency and conventional operations.



Fort Leavenworth

Fort Leavenworth is the oldest continuously operating military installation west of the Mississippi River and the Army's center for excellence in combined arms education, doctrine, and leader development. This historic post, noted for its campus setting, open green spaces and hometown character, is home for the Army's Combined Arms Center (CAC), a major subordinate headquarters of the US Army Training and Doctrine Command. Often referred to as the "Intellectual Center of the Army," CAC's mission is to prepare the Army and its leaders for war. Fort Leavenworth is also home to several subordinate and tenant organizations including the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College, Combined Arms Center for Training (including the Battle Command Training Program and the National Simulations Center), the Center for Army Lessons Learned, and the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks.



US Reserves and Kansas National Guard

The Guard and Reserves organize, train, and equip citizen soldiers/airmen to ensure their rapid mobilization for duties within the state, nation and around the world. While Reserves augment active duty forces, the Guard is unique, serving the Governor or President in times of crises. The Guard and Reserves contribute from various facilities across the state.
