Did You Know In MARYLAND

- Maryland hosts 17 military facilities, ten of which are major installations.
- DoD employs more than 118,000 uniformed and civilian personnel statewide, which accounts for 3.4% of total state employment. ¹
- As a result of Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) Act of 2005, Maryland gained new military commands, new responsibilities in homeland security and defense, and nearly 30,000 DoD military and civilian jobs.

THE MARYLAND MILITARY DEPARTMENT – MARYLAND NATIONAL GUARD

The Maryland Military Department consists of the Maryland Army National Guard, Maryland Air National Guard, Maryland Emergency Management Agency, and Marland Defense Force. The Maryland Military Department's mission is to staff, train, equip, and deploy its National Guard units and citizen-soldiers and airmen in support of federal and state missions as directed by the President of the United States and the Governor of Maryland.




FORT GEORGE G. MEADE/NATIONAL SECURITY AGENCY

Fort Meade serves as an administrative installation supporting the missions of over 50 tenants representing a wide variety of training, intelligence, and educational programs. In the 1950s, the post became headquarters to the National Security Agency. DoD decided through Defense Base Closure and Realignment 2005 and otherwise to move the Defense Information Systems Agency, the Defense Media Activity, and U.S. Department of Defense Cyber Command on to post.



ABERDEEN PROVING GROUND (APG)

Established on the shores of the Chesapeake Bay in 1917, Aberdeen Proving Ground (APG) is the Army's oldest active proving ground. APG covers more than 72,500 acres and is one of the Army's most diversified installations, encompassing more than 60 different tenant activities representing every facet of technology. The installation provides the platform to perform research, development, testing, and evaluation of Army materiel for the US Army Communications-Electronics Command, US Army Research, Development and Engineering Command and the Army Test and Evaluation Command. Facilities include research laboratories, state-of-the-art ranges, engineering test courses for wheeled and tracked vehicles, and a wide variety of research and training including chemical and biological defense.



FORT DETRICK

As a U.S. Army Medical Command installation, Fort Detrick is home to the U.S. Army Medical Research and Materiel Command, the U.S. Army Medical Research Institute of Infectious Diseases among many other commands, and hosts the National Institutes of Health's National Cancer Institute-Frederick (NCI-Frederick). The primary missions include biomedical research and development, medical materiel management, and global telecommunications.



NATIONAL NAVAL MEDICAL CENTER BETHESDA (NNMC)

As a result of Defense Base Realignment and Closure Act of 2005, NNMC Bethesda, the flagship of the Navy's system of medical centers, will combine with Walter Reed Army Medical Center creating the Walter Reed National Military Medical Center at Bethesda. Changes as part of the realignment include addition of the Traumatic Brain Injury/Post Traumatic Stress Disorder Intrepid Center of Excellence and dedicated Warrior Transition Brigade Barracks.



ANDREWS AIR FORCE BASE

Andrews AFB is the home of Air Force One and the Air Force District of Washington's 316th Wing – the base's host wing – with several partner units on base including Air Mobility Command's 89th Airlift Wing, the Air Force Office of Special Investigation headquarters, Air Force Reserve Command's 459th Air Refueling Wing, D.C. Air National Guard's 113th Wing, the Naval Air Facility, and Army and Marine Corps detachments.



NAVAL SUPPORT FACILITY (NSF) INDIAN HEAD

NSF Indian Head has a history dating back to 1890, when the U.S. Navy established the facility as the Naval Proving Ground with the responsibility for testing naval guns, powder, fuses, and other naval ordnance. One of eight divisions of the Naval Sea Systems Command Warfare Center Enterprise, NSF Indian Head is a major contributor to the nation's knowledge and development of ordnance and weapons systems.



NAVAL AIR STATION (NAS) PATUXENT RIVER

Home to the Naval Air Systems Command Headquarters, NAS Patuxent River supports the Navy's principal research, development, test, evaluation, and engineering and fleet support activity for manned and unmanned aircraft, engines, avionics, aircraft support systems, and ship/shore/air operations. With more than 165,000 air operations annually, activities at Patuxent River fly 140 aircraft (40+ type/model/series) over 780 restricted and 5,000 controlled square miles.



U.S. NAVAL ACADEMY/NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY ANNAPOLIS

Established in 1845 as the undergraduate college of the naval service, the U.S. Naval Academy strives to accomplish its mission to develop midshipmen "morally, mentally, and physically." The Naval Support Activity (NSA) Annapolis command is responsible for the delivery of common operating support services to the Naval Academy Complex, Naval Research Laboratory Chesapeake Beach Detachment, and Commander Naval Security Group at Fort George G. Meade, Maryland.
